PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

It wasn't if, but when and where. On Wednesday evening, May 20th, two staffers at the Israeli embassy in Washington, DC., Sarah Milgrim and Yaron Lischinsky were coming out of an event for young diplomats and professionals at the Capital Jewish Museum when they were assassinated by a gunman who then yelled, "Free, free Palestine!" There is a lot that could be said. I could talk about the fact that they were a bi-religious couple; Mr. Lischinsky, an Israeli citizen, was in fact Christian though of late had been identifying more as Jewish, as his mother was Christian. Ms. Milgrim was Jewish. They were both very much pro-peace and searching for a way to end the violence. They were two weeks away from being engaged; Mr. Lischinsky had bought a ring and was planning on proposing in a trip they were scheduled to take to Israel within two weeks.

Sarah's mother, once she knew that her daughter's cell phone locator app showed that she was at the site, said she knew, before she received a call from Israel's ambassador to the U.N. to inform her and extend his and Israel's condolences.

Their assassin, Elias Rodriguez, appears to have been willing to shoot anyone at this Jewish Museum event.

There will be the usual handwringing, temporary increases in security at sites and events, and then something like this will happen again.

One tries to make some sense out of all this. Maybe someone else can, but I can't. All I can say is that we need to be better to ourselves and each other because maybe that's all we will have going forward.

Temple Beth El 90th Anniversary Celebration Planned

In the fall of 1935, eight Jewish families were invited to the home of Mr. Benjamin Krohn to meet with Rabbi Joshua Cohen of Temple Beth El in Utica. All those attending this gathering felt that it was time to formally organize into a religious group. The result of this meeting: The Oneonta Jewish Community became a reality. Temple Beth El has continued to grow as our spiritual home, a place to shape our families' Jewish lives. Temple Beth El's mission is to teach Judaism by example and by precept: through worship, learning, and community activities. The synagogue has continued to offer religious services, children's education, adult study groups, music programs, for members, non-members, students of the four surrounding colleges, and to visitors from out of town.

This year is Temple Beth El's 90th anniversary. In celebrating our anniversary, we want to commemorate our commitment to keep alive our history, our traditions, and our faith. We will honor those who have worked to encourage Judaism in our community and salute those who presently fight for our Judaism and set an example for our children. The tentative date for the anniversary celebration will be October 26, 2025. We are currently forming a committee to develop plans and direct the celebration. THE PRIESTLY BENEDICTION CONJURES UP UNIVERSAL EMOTIONS

The Priestly Benediction of this year's June 7 Torah portion, Naso, conjures universal emotions. The reciting of this blessing is one of my earliest childhood memories. When I was 6 years old, I went to High Holy Day services with my grandfather and father in a small Orthodox synagogue in Pittsburgh. I remember my grandfather telling me: "Don't look at them, the Kohanim reciting the blessing on the Bemah. It will bring you bad luck." Of course, being 6 years old, I had to look. What I saw were a bunch of old men muttering some

Hebrew while covering their heads with their Tallit and flashing the "V" sign between their third and fourth fingers. It was rather scary stuff for a kid in the early 1960's.

The "V" they formed I later learned was to form the Hebrew letter "shin" standing for the first letter of one of the words for God. Traditionally, all descendants of the Priestly class, the Kohanim, did this as part of the ritual before reciting the Priestly Benediction. The Mishnah describes the blessing as given by the priests in the Temple from an elevated platform called the "Duchan." Even with the destruction of the Second Temple in 70 ACE, the tradition is still practiced to this very day during the High Holy Days. The blessing has also become universal to be said at all life cycle events. As a cantor I have recited this blessing for weddings, funerals, B'nai mitzvah, brit, and at the bedsides of terminally ill patients. For many, it creates a wide range of emotions. Think about the words that are being recited during an individual's or families' personal life events. It can be quite powerful. The first line deals more with the physical world like having a home, food and clothing. The second line deals more with addressing emotional needs. The third line addresses our deepening of our relationship with God. In essence, the prayer is gradually guiding you from your physical needs to the ultimate spiritual connection.

Rabbi Kushner concludes by suggesting that this is truly a "sacred relationship, panimel panim, face to face" with God. Rabbi Citrin goes a step further suggesting the words trigger emotions when we feel most alive and present. "Hearing the Birkat HaKohanim can trigger intimate memories for all of us, both good and bad." Rabbi Abraham Joshua Heschel may have said it best: "It takes three things for a sense of significant being: God, a soul and a moment. Just to live is holy. The blessing extends the significance to our existence, building moments in our daily lives that touch eternity." Read and think about this blessing and what emotions it creates for your own life's history and experiences:

May God bless you and keep you
May God's presence shine upon you and be gracious to you
May God's presence be with you and give you peace

It is my wish that as you reflect upon this blessing from this Torah portion, that you find it meaningful and uplifting.

TORAH PARASHAS IN JUNE

June 7 – Naso – (Numbers 4:21–7:89) "Naso" means "Count!" There is a count of able men who will carry the Tabernacle. (The total was 8,580 men.) The laws of the Nazir are given – to not drink wine, to not cut their hair, and have no contact with a dead body. (Samson was a Nazarite.) Aaron and his sons learn how to bless the people. The heads of the 12 tribes bring gifts to the altar.

June 14 – Behaalotecha – (Numbers 8:1–12:16) "Behaalotecha" means "When you raise". G-d tells Moses to have Aaron raise light in the menorah. The people leave Mt. Sinai and soon tire of the constant diet of manna, demanding meat. Moses picks 70 elders to help him deal with the people's issues.

June 21 – Shlach – (Numbers 13:1–15:41) "Shlach" means "Send". G-d tells Moses to send scouts to look over the land, one to represent each tribe. They were gone for 40 days and came back, ten of them saying the land was "flowing with milk and honey" but that the people were giants and cannibals. Caleb told Moses the Israelites could take them.

June 28 – Korach – (Numbers 16:1–18:32) Korach leads a rebellion against Moses' leadership. The earth swallows him up.
