We Should be the Driver for the High Holy Days

We should be the driver for the High Holy Days. We should use this time of year to take on the responsibilities of asking for forgiveness. Do not let someone else drive, but rather do it ourselves. Indeed, our Jewish faith has always emphasized "self-determination" rather than waiting for God to intervene. We should not wait for God to determine our fate, nor ask God to forgive us for our sins against other human beings. Especially at the times of the Days of Awe. We should not wait for God to intervene. We, as humans, should take the initiative to ask for forgiveness.

This self-determination is a part of our Jewish DNA. Jacob wrestled with an angel, demanding and challenging the authority of God. Abraham did the same when he negotiated with God in the story of Sodom and Gemora. Moses also convinced God not to destroy the Israelites after they worshipped the Golden Calf. We should use the same "Chutzpah" in asking for forgiveness from sin.

Do not wait for others to forgive or apologize to us.

It is almost as if as Rabbi Dov Peretz Elkins describes our process as a metaphoric bridge: "Forgiveness is a path to be walked. There are steps along the way; loss, anger, acceptance, learning, forgiveness, and restoration." We have to cross that bridge of our own volition and our own initiative.

But we as humans have to make those first steps ourselves and not depend on God to tell or coerce us to do so. Rabbi Peter Tarlow may have said it best: "We can use our life to be people of character by performing mitzvot throughout our lives, or give in to moments of rage, anger, selfishness and egocentricity. From the perspective of this most holy time of the year, the choice is ours and ours alone."

Torah Parashot for September

September 6 – <u>Ki Teitzei</u> – (Deuteronomy 21:10 to 25:19) "Ki Teitzei" means "When you go out". It lists 74 laws and commandments, the most in any parashah.

September 13 – <u>Ki Tavo</u> – (Deuteronomy 26:1-29:8) "Ki Tavo" means "When you come in." After again listing blessings if we do the right thing and curses if we do wrong, Moses tells the people that only now, after 40 years of wandering, do they have "a heart to know, eyes to see and ears to hear."

September 20 – <u>Nitzavim</u> – (Deuteronomy 29:9-30.20) "Nitzavim" means "Standing". Moses tells the people G-d set life and death, good and evil before them, blessing and curse- "Choose life."

September 27 – Vayelech/Shabbat Shuva – (Deuteronomy 31:1–30) Vayelech" means "and he (Moses) went." Moses, at 120 years, speaks to the people for the last time. Leadership is transferred to Joshua.


